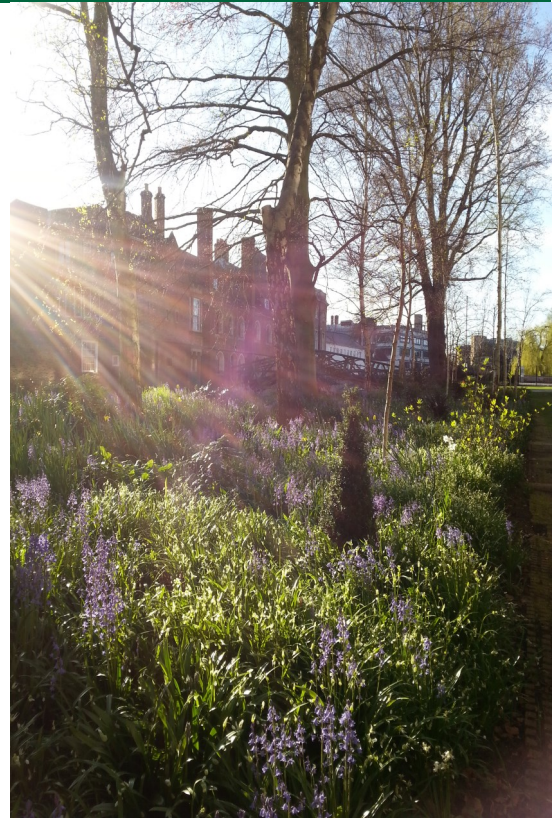

University of Southern California (USC)
Exchange Programme MT20

Available to a recently graduated undergraduate, to visit USC for one semester (autumn) to undertake study in any field.

Applicants should send a CV with a covering letter indicating the chosen course of study and outlining funding arrangements. The application should include a statement of not more than 750 words concerning the benefits you hope to derive from the scheme.

Queens' College will reimburse the cost of one return airfare (economy class) to California. The student is responsible for all other funding arrangements.

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Munro Studentships 2020—2nd and 3rd Year Research (CPGS, NOTAF, PhD) Students

Munro studentships are available to second and third year research students. If you would like to be considered for a Munro Studentship for 2020/21 please let the DoS for whom you supervise know that you are interested in applying as soon as possible.

The aim of the Munro Studentships is to support teaching needs in various subjects. Usually our Munro Students do three or four hours teaching per week for the College. Remuneration is in kind: you will be provided with College accommodation at a subsidised rent and some commons free of charge. There is no stipend attached. In the past, Munro Students have sometimes gone on to gain Research Fellowships at Queens' and elsewhere.

The primary purpose of the Munro Studentships is to meet the teaching needs of the College. The key selection criterion is the candidate's demonstrable ability to supply high quality teaching according to the College's need.

A Munro student shall normally be appointed for one year.

Applications should consist of:

- 1) A covering letter.
- 2) A current CV.
- 3) A statement listing your current supervising experience to date (please list the Tripos and the courses/papers you have supervised in Cambridge, including number of students and which College), and potential supervising for the next academic year (listing Tripos and possible courses/papers and the likely number of students).
- 4) A letter of reference from the DoS at Queens' for whom you supervise. **NOTE:** Please obtain the endorsement of the appropriate DoS prior to submitting your application.

Please submit items (1) (2) and (3) above to your DoS by Friday, 27 March 2020

Your DoS will then add a letter of reference and forward your application to the Tutorial Office.

Newnham College—The Phyllis and Eileen Gibbs Travelling Research Fellowships 2020-21

Supporting post-doctoral women researchers carrying out substantial fieldwork outside the UK and Ireland. The Fellowship pays research, travel and subsistence expenses of up to £18,000.

Gibbs Fellows are elected Senior Members of Newnham College, Cambridge for the duration of the Fellowship, with research support and associated benefits.

Award criteria include:

- * Considerable experience of research (at least doctoral level) in Biology, Archaeology, Social Anthropology or Sociology.
- * Women who are, or have been, members of the University of Cambridge
- * Fieldwork outside the UK, Ireland, and one's own country of residence.

Any award must be used for expenses in the field.

Eligibility criteria:

- * Graduate women who are or have been members of any College or Approved Foundation or Approved Society in, or University Officers in, the University of Cambridge
- * Research to be conducted outside the UK, Ireland, Isle of Man and Channel Islands and normally not within an applicant's own country of residence, if this is different
- * Graduate students who will have completed their PhD before taking up a Fellowship are eligible to apply

The Tyro Music Prize

The Tyro Music Prize was established to promote the music-making of everyday students at Queens' (i.e., rather than Music students, music scholars, people with a diploma on an instrument), in the hope of encouraging people who play an instrument purely as a hobby to continue their music making whilst at Queens', and to allow confidence in music to spread to the rest of their university life.

The Tyro competition is open to graduate and undergraduate students at Queens': all you have to do is to e-mail MagSoc President Mia Willow (president@magsoc.net), to express an interest and receive an application form. The deadline for applications is 18 February.



The performers will come together to give an informal concert at 7pm on Monday 24 February in Old Hall. At the end of the evening, an award will be made of £100 to one of the entrants, to further their musical life in the college. There is no minimum standard for the piece presented: instead, the judges will be interested only in the performance and what the music means to you. MagSoc can provide a piano accompanist if one is required.

Students who are reading Music at Queens', hold a music degree or diploma or are Organ Scholars or Choral Scholars at Queens' or another institution are **not** eligible to enter the competition.
