THE VISIT OF THE PATRONESS

The year has been marked by the visit of our Patroness, Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, on 5 June 1961 to open the Erasmus Building.

As she entered the College, the Queen Mother was presented to the President, and then, followed by the Fellows in procession, she passed through lines of cheering undergraduates and members of the College staff to the President's Lodge, where Mrs Armitage and her daughters, the Fellows and their wives, were presented.

The Queen Mother then proceeded straight to the Library, where she had sherry with a company of some fifty undergraduates. This was followed by lunch in the newly decorated Hall with the Governing Body, the Scholars of the College and one or two other guests.

A highlight of the visit was the presentation in Cloister Court of a scene from *Richard III*, the May Week production of the 'Bats'. The producer, A. J. Arlidge, and members of the cast were presented to Her Majesty.

After seeing the excerpt, Her Majesty moved to the New Building, where large numbers of undergraduates, old members of the College and their relations awaited her. In a speech, which is printed below, she used for the first time the name Erasmus Building by which it is now known. After mingling with the guests, she had tea in the President's garden with a party which included the Honorary Fellows, while the other guests continued the Garden Party in the College courts, proud of an occasion which the unhurried calm of our Patroness had rendered fully memorable.

The following is the text of the speech by the Queen Mother at the Opening Ceremony:

As your Patron I have always taken a particular interest in the affairs of the College, and I am very pleased to be with you on this happy occasion.

Six centuries of English history are written into the building of Queens'; each one marking a stage in its development. In the past, endowments of the College came from benefactors, sometimes Royal, religious or commercial.

Today, it must be a source of pride to you that this building

has been made possible by the contributions of 1500 members of the College, whose generosity is proof of their loyalty to this place, and of their firm belief in the future.

Those who will benefit most from the latest additions will be the undergraduates, for a greater number of them will be able to live in College, and to share more closely in its corporate life.

To many who come up to Cambridge, the University is the first step outside their family circle, and it is of the utmost importance that the undergraduate should feel himself to be an integral part of the life of his College, and find in it the companionship and stimulus which may well prove as precious as the more formal teaching of the University.

In the past 500 years members of Queens' have achieved fame in many walks of life. It is fitting that this new building should be called after the man who, by his passion for learning, became the foremost scholar of Europe at what Froude called the most exciting period in modern history.

Erasmus belonged to those splendid days of the Renaissance when learning flowered with unprecedented vigour, and the scholars of England were linked with the wider commonwealth of European learning, of which universities are the most characteristic inventions.

The ideal of the Renaissance was 'the whole man'. A man cultivated in the arts of peace and war; often, scholar, poet, politician and soldier at the same time.

I believe that today all universities are aware of the dangers of narrow specialization. They hope to recover some measure of that 'wholeness' in the training of their students, and I trust that in achieving that we shall see the best qualities of the Renaissance enriching our own times.

In that hope I now have much pleasure in naming the new addition to Queens' College—'The Erasmus Building'.

The Erasmus Building

The Erasmus Building, the latest addition to the College, was designed by Sir Basil Spence and built by William Sindall, Ltd, the Cambridge builders and contractors.

Part of the cost—£61,000, or over half—has been provided by members of the college in response to our appeal.

The building is in brick and specially selected Cotswold stone, and it provides accommodation for forty-three undergraduates and two Fellows.

It is L-shaped in design and is situated on the side of the Bowling Green that is further from the river, completing the Court formed by the Chapel, Friars' Building and Dokett Building.

By supporting the building on brick arches and concrete pillars, the architect has been able to maintain a sense of spaciousness and, indeed, the view from the Court to 'the Backs' has been opened up and enhanced. It is modern in design, but great care has been taken to harmonize it with the pattern of existing college buildings.

There are three storeys of undergraduate rooms, with fitted furniture consisting of adjustable book shelves, wash basin, food cupboard, hanging wardrobe and clothes shelves.

Bathroom facilities include showers, and modern needs are reflected in the provision of a drying-room.

The passages are heated by radiant panels contained in the ceilings. The rooms themselves are heated by hot water convectors. Both space heating and hot water for washing are derived from a new oil-fired installation in the basement of the Dokett Building.

The building represents a considerable addition to the amenities of the College. It is being used not to increase numbers of undergraduates but to enable those who come to the college to have a full share of the facilities afforded to Cambridge undergraduate life.

THE SOCIETY

The death of Mr Wood on 18 March 1961 deprived the College of its Senior and most colourful Fellow. Well known for many years as Dean and later as Rector of St Botolph's, he was active almost to the end. An appreciation is given below, taken from *The Times* of 20 March 1961.

The President is a member of the Standing Advisory Committee on Grants to Students.

Mr Deakin was in Ghana for the Michaelmas Term giving a course of lectures on 'Engineering Problems in Ghana' at the

University of Kumasi, of which the Vice-Chancellor was his first student in engineering.

Dr Holloway is on leave of absence for three years as Byron Professor of Poetry in the National University of Athens.

Mr Mathias was Visiting Professor in the Department of Political Economy, University of Toronto, Canada. He lectured in several universities in Canada and the United States.

Two new Fellows have been elected. Dr Beament, well known to many generations of undergraduates for his activities with the 'Bats', is University Lecturer in Zoology and Administrative Officer of the Department of Zoology, much concerned with the organisation of science teaching. Mr Brown is Senior Research Officer in Applied Economics.

There are also two new Honorary Fellows, both already members of the College: the Archbishop of Cape Town and Sir Thomas Padmore.

It is with great regret that we record the death, on 15 January 1962, of Sir Shenton Thomas, Honorary Fellow.

MR WOOD

The Rev. Charles Travers Wood, Senior Fellow of Queens' College, Cambridge, died on Saturday, 18 March 1961, in his eighty-sixth year. He was born in Cheshire in 1875, educated at Shrewsbury, and won an entrance scholarship in Classics at Pembroke College, Cambridge, to which he went in 1894. He had there a brilliant career. He was placed in the First Class (Division 2) in the First Part of the Classical Tripos in 1897, and in the First Class in Part 1 of the Theological Tripos in 1899. In 1898 he won the Jeremie Septuagint Prize, in 1899 the Bachelor's Carus Greek Testament Prize and the Crosse Studentship, and in 1900 the First Tyrwhitt's Hebrew Scholarship and the Mason Hebrew Prize.

He was elected into a fellowship at Queens' College in 1900, being ordained deacon in that year, and priest in 1901. He was Senior Chaplain and Dean from 1907 to 1940, and taught Hebrew and Old Testament subjects from 1900 to 1940. In 1940 he retired from his college offices—except that of Director of Theological Studies, which he retained for a few years longer—and became

rector of St Botolph's Church. As a Life Fellow under older and happier statutes he retained his rooms, in the Walnut Tree Court. He never married.

Mr Wood was a versatile man. When an undergraduate he ran for Cambridge in Cross Country against Oxford. He maintained throughout his long life an enthusiasm for games and for walking and camping. A sunny day in winter was for him to the end a signal for a bathe in the Cam. He was a keen scout and generations of Cambridge boys owe more than they can easily estimate to his kindness and enthusiasm. Many undergraduates also owed to him their introduction to the best of the countryside. In all these activities he was inexhaustible. Academically he might perhaps be said to have started and not had time rather than not been able—to finish. There are only three books. They are well done but not notable. He was a disciple of Westcott, Lightfoot, and Hort, and added Ryle and G. A. Smith to his list of modern prophets of Biblical themes. He knew little of German scholarship and disliked what he knew. Shortly before he retired from his lectureship he addressed the Society for Old Testament Study, defending the traditional dates of the visits of Ezra and Nehemiah to Jerusalem. The pundits were all there, but their criticisms hardly seemed to undermine his defences. Had he attended to Old Testament Studies with the vigour he gave to his innumerable other activities he would have made a great name as a scholar. But then his world would have lost many acts of kindness.

He was a very good and well-loved rector and he will long be remembered in Cambridge. In College business he could be obstinate but never grieved or bore grudges when he lost a motion.

On 19 May 1955 he celebrated his eightieth birthday, and was deeply moved by the many expressions of congratulation and good will which the occasion brought him in his parish and in his College, perhaps especially by a book presented by the junior members of the College to mark the event, containing many contemporary signatures, and by an invitation to preach on the following Sunday in his College Chapel.

GIFTS TO THE COLLEGE

(ADDITIONAL TO THE LIBRARY LIST)

The Vice-President has presented an additional leaf for the mahogany table in the Combination Room.

On the occasion of his appearance in the Honours List, Sir Harold Bailey presented two pairs of bowls for use on the Bowling Green.

Mr Parmée has presented two silver George III dessert spoons, 1796 and 1801; and Mr Hagenbuch a silver tobacco jar to commemorate his tenth anniversary as a Fellow of the College.

LEGACY

Mr Wood, who had previously made a gift of £600, left a further sum of £1000 for the benefit of students of the College intending to take Holy Orders in the Church of England.

THE LIBRARY

The late F. A. Colenutt bequeathed all his remaining books to the College Library, including many first editions of Goethe, Schiller and La Fontaine and a fine copy of the edition of Dante's *Divina Commedia* printed at Venice by Octavianus Scotus in 1484. Together with the many notable gifts made by Mr Colenutt during the last ten years, amongst which were various early printed books of great rarity and value, this benefaction is the most important the College Library has received in recent times.

The late C. T. Wood, Senior Fellow, bequeathed his books to the College Library. This benefaction has provided many useful and important additions to various sections of the Library.

The Rev. J. F. Williams (1897) has added to his earlier benefactions the gift of some fifty volumes.

A new catalogue of the Old Library is now in preparation and, it is hoped, will be completed within two years. This work, which has now been going on for over a year, has been made possible by a bequest under the will of the widow of the former Librarian, Mr F. G. Plaistowe.

THE FABRIC

The Erasmus Building was opened by Her Majesty the Queen Mother in June. It has given much satisfaction to those who have had the fortune to have rooms in it. An interesting discovery made during the building was the well from which water was drawn for the old pump which hides in the little four-doored entrance to the Fellows' garden. The well itself lay about 40 feet to the north-east, and it is not unlikely that it was the one used by the Carmelites. When the old summer house behind Friars was taken down, a finely worked piece of clunch was revealed, recording the narrowing of the Carmelite exit doorway into the garden beyond, or perhaps the blocking of a window. It bears the date 1523.

The redecoration of the Hall was completed in time for Her Majesty's visit. All the Morris wall stencil designs have been restored and the thousand gold stars in the roof re-gilt. The 1948 gold paint on the panelling has been re-done with gold leaf; the effect is brilliant and will last many years. New serving tables have been installed. In the screens, new lighting has been fitted, the notice boards have been moved into the cloisters and the fine wrought iron gates repaired and repainted.

The old willow tree near Silver Street bridge was damaged during the rebuilding there, and it was found that its roots had been attacked by the fungus, *Armillaria mellea*. It had to be taken down; but this eventuality had been foreseen and several cuttings from the old tree had been made a few years ago. The one now replanted is already 12 feet high.

The year 1962 opened with severe weather and brought with it a number of burst pipes, mostly causing little or no damage; but one on S Staircase which went unnoticed over the weekend caused great trouble, and at one time the stairs were thickly covered with ice.

The year began rather discouragingly, despite a promising intake of freshmen and a reserve of experience in five 1st May Colours from the previous year. The first Light Four, having trained hard under L. V. Bevan and J. Parker (both of L.M.B.C. and C.U.B.C.), and 'Bill' Williams, rowed a most dramatic race with L.M.B.C., the lead constantly changing; unfortunately, L.M.B.C. had more in hand, and won eventually by 1.2 seconds. Nor was the Fairbairn Cup Race particularly successful, as the first two Eights, intended as trial Eights for the Lent, finished eighteenth and twenty-first. The bright event of this term was the Colquhoun Sculls, which nearly produced an all-Queens' final: The freshman P. J. Webb won (to go on to win a trial cap and row for 'Goldie') from Napier of L.M.B.C., who defeated J. F. H. Sergeant only after a re-row in the semi-final.

For the Lent Races, an inexperienced but powerful crew containing five freshmen, under the coaching (amongst others) of Peter de Giles and C. N. Hudson, rose one place on the first night at Pembroke's expense, but paid the penalty for a ponderous row-over on the second by being bumped on the third by 1st and 3rd Trinity. With a row-over on Saturday night, the crew thus started and finished fifth on the river. Five of this crew, with three third year May Colours, formed the Reading and Putney Head of the River Crews. After a rather unsatisfactory row at Reading,

finishing sixteenth out of 140, we began to show very real promise at Putney under 'Ham' Ward (T.R.C.), at one stage even out-paddling the Blue Boat. The crew rowed over fifteenth out of 280 crews, thus being the second fastest college crew.

So to the May Term. The first success was expected—the victory of Webb and Sergeant in the Lowe Double Sculls—but nevertheless very welcome. Dr A. S. F. Butcher, J. C. H. Cox and I. W. Welsh, all of Queens', made important contributions to the First Eight's ultimate success, and thanks must go also to Dr G. Gray, I. M. Henderson and J. B. Chaplain for their work with the Second Eight, though limited by the available material. In the May Races themselves the pattern was the same as in the Lents—disappointing. The First Eight bumped Pembroke on the first night, to be bumped by St Catharine's on the third, again starting and finishing fifth. At Henley, however, with one change and the direction of 'Bill' Williams, this crew lost much of its roughness and gained much in speed: in the Ladies Plate, the preliminary round was won by about seven lengths against Emmanuel, but the first round against Pembroke was closer—by one and a half lengths in 7.06. The Thursday race showed the Eight at its best, in a long battle with 1st and 3rd Trinity, which was won by three quarters of a length in 7.05. The semi-final against Lady Margaret B.C.—the eventual winners—was more of a race than the one and a half lengths' verdict suggests, and was by no means a bad row. With six full May Colours in the club next year, prospects must surely be bright.

Cuppers was won in similar style and we finished over fifty points clear of our nearest rivals, Peterhouse. As a result of coming second and fourth respectively D. M.

In the Varsity Match D. M. Turner was second equal, and T. Briault and M. A. Tribe sixth, both being awarded Full Blues. Queens' met with equal success in the road relays.
