Michaelmas 2022 was a busy term for MagSoc! It culminated in our West Road Concert on the 30th November, featuring works by Lili Boulanger and Emilie Mayer, and an outstanding performance of Strauss' Horn Concerto No.1 by second-year history student **Georgia Burr (2021)**.

2022 also featured a first for the MagSoc Chorus - breaking from tradition and from the MagSoc Orchestra, they concluded the term with their own concert in Queens' Chapel. The gambit was a success and they performed music by Sting, Vaughan Williams and Bruckner to a full chapel of family and friends. Revitalised under the leadership of Georgia Edwards (2020), Katja Ruda (2020) and Matthew Mayes (2020), the Chorus is at long last regaining healthy numbers since the pandemic.

Our vibrant weekly recital series in Old Hall and Chapel continues on Sundays at midday and this term featured performances from the Queens' College Graduate Choir, the Queens' Quartet, the Aliki Vatikioti Senior Organ Scholar Benjamin Markovic (2020), pianists Lottie Butler (2021) and Xavier Khalid (2021) and a Freshers' recital.

MagSoc established a new 'informal' orchestra which rehearsed weekly under the leadership of **Matthew Mayes**. It also allowed several Queens' students to try conducting an orchestra for the first time, taking on film music from the Pirates of the Caribbean and the Lord of the Rings.

A final highlight of the term was an Open Mic night in QBar, MC'd by **Gabriel Margolis (2021)** held in collaboration with the Cambridge University Green Week initiative.

We are very proud to have such a lively musical community at Queens' and are looking forward to putting on more concerts in Lent Term!

Actress, director, singer-songwriter and final year Classics student **Hayley Canham** wrote and starred in 5 star hit production *Medea the Musical*. The show made its Cambridge debut at the Town and Gown Theatre in March 2022 before heading up to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

The show was musically directed by **Fleur Gardner-Wray (2020)**, a third-year engineering student choral scholar at Queens' who also played the keys.

As a singer-songwriter, Hayley is known as cannibal. Amassing over a million streams on Spotify, her singles have been played on BBC Radio and she has gigged in the UK and US, including at Henley Festival and Cambridge Big Weekend for BBC Introducing. Hayley's song Let Them Rain was BBC Cambridgeshire's Track of the Week and one of their Top Picks for 2022.
